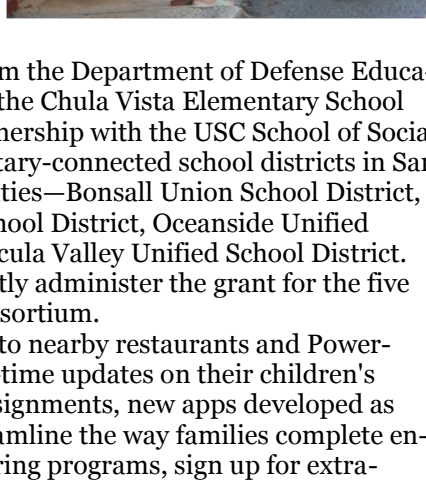

Welcoming Transitions for Military Students Experiencing Multiple Moves: With a New Partnership Consortium Grant, There Will Be an App for That

Apps on our phones and tablets are meant to make life easier and point us to the services and providers who can meet our needs. There's no reason why such innovation can't also simplify and improve the stressful process that military children and their parents face every time they enroll in a new school.

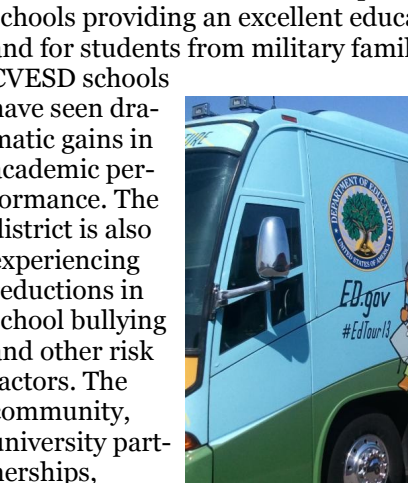
That's the idea behind a new four-year, \$5 million consortium grant from the Department of Defense Education Activity (DoDEA) to the Chula Vista Elementary School District (CVESD), in partnership with the USC School of Social Work and four other military-connected school districts in San Diego and Riverside counties—Bonsall Union School District, Fallbrook Union High School District, Oceanside Unified School District and Temecula Valley Unified School District. USC and CVESD will jointly administer the grant for the five school districts in the consortium.

Just as Yelp directs us to nearby restaurants and PowerSchool gives parents real-time updates on their children's grades and homework assignments, new apps developed as part of the grant will streamline the way families complete enrollment forms, find tutoring programs, sign up for extra-curricular or after-school programs, learn about community-based resources and stay in touch with key district contacts who can answer additional questions. U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan Visits Chula Vista School

Education Secretary Arne Duncan's "Strong Start, Bright Future" Back-to-School Bus Tour pulled into Chula Vista last week for a stop at Castle Park Middle School.



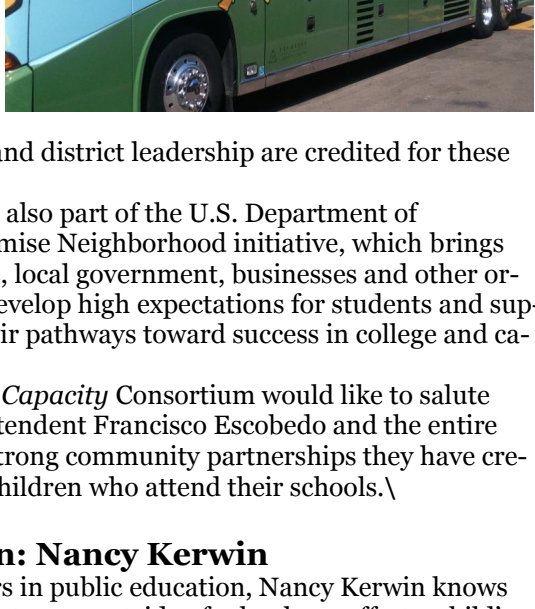
Dr. Justin Cunningham, Dr. Colette Ingraham, who chairs San Diego State University's school psychology program, and Dr. Michael Rank, the director of the USC San Diego Academic Center. University interns placed in Consortium schools also attend the event.

Duncan greeted students, staff and other attendees and held a "town hall" meeting to discuss topics including college access, early learning, family engagement and juvenile justice. See [this report](#) from the NBC affiliate in San Diego.

The bus tour was meant, in part, to highlight examples of schools providing an excellent education for English learners and for students from military families. In recent years, CVESD schools have seen dramatic gains in academic performance. The district is also experiencing reductions in school bullying and other risk factors. The community, university partnerships, strong school administrators and district leadership are credited for these changes.

Castle Park is also part of the U.S. Department of Education's Promise Neighborhood initiative, which brings together schools, local government, businesses and other organizations to develop high expectations for students and support them in their pathways toward success in college and careers.

The *Building Capacity* Consortium would like to salute CVESD Superintendent Francisco Escobedo and the entire district for the strong community partnerships they have created to benefit children who attend their schools.



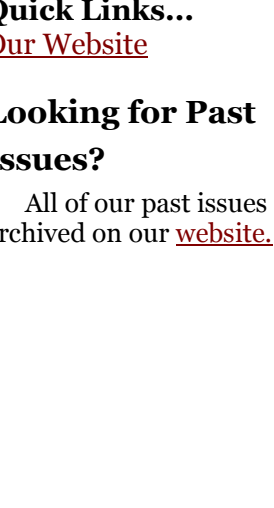

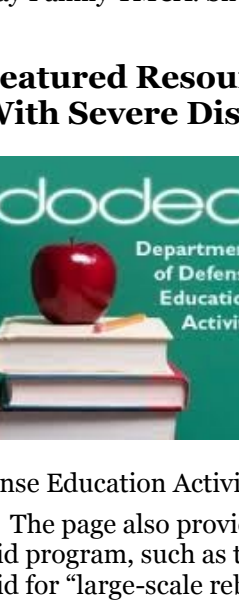

Spotlight On: Nancy Kerwin

After 33 years in public education, Nancy Kerwin knows well how circumstances outside of school can affect a child's education.



As the executive director of Student, Family and Community Services for the Chula Vista Elementary School District (CVESD), Kerwin works to make sure schools are stable and welcoming places for the city's military children and parents.

Kerwin has worked closely with the Building Capacity team and will continue to play an important role in the new consortium involving CVESD, USC and four other school districts. (See story above.)

In addition to teaching special education and elementary grades, Kerwin has also served as a pupil services specialist, a principal, the coordinator of early intervention services and the director of early intervention services.

She received her bachelor's degree from Simmons College in Boston, a master's in special education from George Washington University in Washington, D.C. and a master's in educational leadership from Seattle University.

Kerwin also serves on the boards of the Chula Vista Police Activity League, South Bay Community Services and the South Bay Family YMCA. She is a member of Chula Vista Kiwanis.

Featured Resource: Impact Aid for Children With Severe Disabilities

The federal Impact Aid program reimburses local education agencies for the funds they spend to serve military children with severe disabilities.

These reimbursements are available to districts with at least two children with these severe special needs.
